
Property

- Decreased property value
- Disruption of property
- Inability to sell
- Inability to get mortgage or re-finance
- Restricted use of property with pipeline
- Minimal compensation
- Construction hassles
- Pay taxes on land with limited use
- Forced to surrender property via eminent domain

Jobs and Economy

- Majority of jobs created are only temporary during the construction phase
- Many of which are skilled labor jobs often hired from outside the local community
- 20 permanent jobs may be created





The Effects of a Pipeline

Fracking Infrastructure

- Supports the destructive and dirty method of extracting natural gas
- Supports large amounts of natural gas from the fracking site
- Gas and utility companies benefit at a cost to landowners and the environment

Environment

- High risk of releasing gas and/or hazardous liquids into our drinking water
- Contributes to accelerated climate change
- Methane leaks
 - Methane is a more potent greenhouse gas than carbon dioxide
- Compressor stations will release large amounts of air pollution including sulfur dioxide, nitrogen oxides, volatile organic compounds, carbon monoxide, and particulate matter.

Human Health

- Noisy polluting infrastructure such as compressor stations, metering stations
- Pipelines carry Radon, a radioactive gas
- Potential for explosions, fires, and gas spills in your area



Atlantic Coast Pipeline (ACP) Facts

 Dominion Transmission, Duke Energy, Piedmont Natural Gas, and AGL Resources are planning on building two natural gas pipelines; the ACP being one of them.



- The purpose of this project is to transport shale gas from Ohio, West Virginia, and Pennsylvania.
- The ACP is proposed to run 550 miles through West Virginia, Virginia, and North Carolina.



- The ACP would disrupt 12,972 acres of land during construction and retain 4,370 acres permanently. You are receiving this notice because the construction will affect your property in your county.
- This will leave lasting impacts on your property, the local economy, and the environment.
